Section 1: From Passion to Opportunity

Consider your Discernment work from Friday evening, taking into consideration everything you've heard.

Reflect: Consider your Discernment work from Friday evening. Ask God to help you summarize or 'name' one or two opportunities that He is highlighting to you from this work. (One example might be: Responding to homelessness in my neighbourhood through a housing initiative, championing an anti-black-racism group in my church)

Discuss and Pray:

- Share these opportunities with your church team or table. Once everyone has shared, notice what resonates with the group. Encourage and affirm one another by engaging the 'wisdom' space from Friday.
- 2. Pray: Take a few minutes to pray as a team, table, or smaller group. Offer these opportunities to God and ask Him to begin to highlight to your team one or two specific areas to focus on.

Focus: Decide as a team how you will proceed for the rest of this Lab. Will your church team work with one idea? Will you divide into subgroups and develop 2-3 of your strongest ideas? Will you continue on individually?

Section 2: From Service to Solidarity

Reflect: As you consider the opportunity the Spirit is highlighting to you, let's begin by checking our motivations, assumptions, and the structural issues at play. This groundwork will help frame yours and your church's 'holy action.'

3	Where am I, and where is our church, an ongoing part of the problem? [Where do I allow injustice to persist in my workplace, community, and/or family? Where is injustice present in our church?]

Ask God to clarify a new path forward. Ask for His power to guide you. Take space to listen for words, whisperings, Scripture, etc. that He may be speaking to you, your team, table, or small group.
	Section 3: Cultivating a Response
